May 28, 2019 School Board Report

1. April 15th Regular Meeting:
 - a. Report on Fall 2018 Healthy Youth Survey.
 - i. This survey is sponsored by the Washington State Dept. of Health and OSPI.
 - ii. Shoreline students in grades 6, 8, 10, and 12 have taken the Healthy Youth Survey (HYS) every other year since 2004.
 - iii. State, county, and Educational Service District level data are available to the community at www.askhys.net. To access district level data, permission from the superintendent must be sought and granted.
 - iv. Highlights:
 1. 16% of grade 12 students reported using e-cigarettes on school property in past 30 days.
 2. 31% of grade 12 students reported using marijuana in the past 30 days, comparable to 19% of grade 10 students.
 3. 15% of grade 12 students reported being drunk or high at school in the past year, comparable to 16% of grade 10 students.
 4. 26% of grade 8 students reported being bullied in the past 30 days, comparable to 20% and 16% of grade 10 and 12 students, respectively.
 5. 61% of grade 6 students reported enjoying school “often” or “almost always”, comparable to 32% of grade 12 students.
 6. 36% of grade 12 students reported depression (feeling so sad or hopeless almost every day for two weeks or more in a row that they stopped doing some usual activities) in the past year.
 7. 20% of grade 12 students reported having seriously considered suicide in the past year, comparable to 24% of grade 10 and 22% of grade 8 students.
 8. Over 70% of students in grades 8, 10, and 12 reported knowing how to report bullying at school.
 9. Over 75% of students in grades 6, 8, 10, and 12 reported feeling safe at school: 91% of grade 6 students (high), 79% of grade 10 students (low).
 - b. District Instructional Materials Committee Recommendations.
 - i. Elementary math curriculum adoption recommendation.
 1. Bridges in Math K-5

- a. Western names are not standard in curricula, reflecting consideration of equity and bias.
 - c. Presentation of Preliminary 2018-2019 Debt Service Fund Budget Extension.
 - i. Budget extension is required to reflect bonds sold after 2018-2019 Debt Service Fund budget was adopted by the Board.
 - ii. The purpose of the resolution is to increase the appropriation by \$6,055,719 for expenditures from \$19,579,000 to \$25,634,719.
 - 1. The principal and bond payment processing fees did not change, however the interest did.
 - iii. A public hearing will be conducted to take public input on the proposed budget extension on May 6.
 - d. February 2019 Financial Update and April 2019 Enrollment.
 - e. Community Comments:
 - i. Two civics students from Shorewood High School: We ask the school board to consider changing start times to 8:45 am. The Seattle School District has opted for later times and report better attendance rates and test scores in core classes. Earlier wake times are associated with circadian rhythm disruption, anxiety, decreased focus, decreased physical activity, and higher chance of risk behaviors.
 - ii. Shorecrest Senior from TSA: Thank you to the Shoreline School District for providing the opportunity to participate in the Washington Technical Student Association and to compete as a part of TSA in STEM competitions. DECA and TSA deserve greater recognition from the district.
 - iii. Two civics students from Shorewood High School: Non-school devices are forced to use guestnet, which subjects students with personal devices to slower internet speeds and a restrictive filter. Students should be able to use their own personal devices without limitation as the iPads are not an adequate learning tool.
- 2. May 6th Regular Meeting:
 - a. Report on Early Release Implementation.
 - i. Initial goal was to broaden the instructional repertoires of all staff to teach in ways that are meaningful to individual students and to provide regular and consistent time to engage in collaboration, professional development, and planning.
 - ii. Four key strategic pathways:
 - 1. Culturally responsive practices.
 - a. Get to know your student.
 - 2. Professional Learning Communities (PLCs).

3. Student-centered instruction.
 - a. Student choice.
 4. Instructional leadership.
 - b. Presentation of 2018-2019 General Fund Update and Preliminary Budget Extension.
 - c. Adoption of DIMC Recommendations for K-5 Mathematics.
 - d. Public Hearing and Adoption of Resolution 2019-6, Fixing, Approving and Adopting the Extension of the 2018-2019 Debt Service Fund Budget.
 - e. Community Comments:
 - i. Two Shorewood seniors: There is an economic barrier for many students at Shorewood high school to practice safe sex. 58.95% of students surveyed say they would benefit from various forms of birth control offered through the school directly. Condoms should be provided through the nurse's office to help prevent unwanted pregnancy and the spread of STDs.
3. May 20th Regular Meeting:
 - a. Revision to policy 2336, Ceremonies and Observances.
 - i. In addition to Veteran's Day, the observance of Constitution Day, Temperance and Good Citizenship Day, and Disability History Month were added to the district's policy.
 - ii. The name of the policy was also changed to "State-Required Ceremonies and Observances" to provide distinction between what is state-mandated and what the district values.
 - b. March Financial Update and May enrollment.
 - i. Nothing of significance to note.
 - c. Community Comments/Board Reports:
 - i. Resident of Lake Forest Park: the district's publication of the public hearing for the budget extension in the Seattle Times was equal, but not equitable; not everyone gets the Seattle Times. I agree with the comment stating that school districts should not be funding city projects. Remember that it is Reverend Martin Luther King Jr., address the man with his proper title.
 - ii. Director Wilson: the Shorewood Bio Expo was amazing, hats off to Hannah Crowder for putting it together.
